Completion of the full CSU or UC IGETC certification (CA), Washington and Oregon state-approved Direct Transfer degrees or other state's equivalent transfer certification prior to the student being admitted, enrolled and attending his/her first session in a bachelor degree program at Brandman satisfies all Brandman University GE requirements except LBSU 300. Students who matriculate to Brandman with partial GE certifications will have their coursework evaluated on a course by course basis to determine appropriate applicability to each general education category.

<b>Concentrations &amp; Major Electives</b>	
Student can choose from seven concentrations: 1. General Criminal Justice (9 credits)	

2. Corrections (12 credits)
3. Criminal Justice Leadership (12 credits)
4. Homeland Security (12 credits)
5. Forensics (12 credits)
6. Victim Advocacy (12 credits)
7. Security Services (12 credits)

The exact number of elective credits depends on the credit requirements (9 to 12) of a student's selected concentration. Thus, if a student selects a concentration that has a 12 credit requirement, then the student will take one (1) elective course. Students may choose from criminal justice, organizational leadership, political science, psychology, social science, and sociology courses to satisfy major elective requirements.
