<i>Claim</i>	Brandman students are 2x more likely to graduate.
<i>Full Statistic</i>	81.0% of Brandman University's non-first-time full-time undergraduates attain an undergraduate degree, which is nearly twice that of private, for-profit institutions.
<i>Supporting Documentation</i>	<p>As a requirement of its Program Participation Agreement for Title IV federal student financial aid programs with the U.S. Department of Education, Brandman University submits data to the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS). Brandman University's graduation rate data is from the IPEDS Outcome Measures data collection.
